Match background

Having already become the first team from Cyprus to reach the knockout phase of the UEFA Champions League, APOEL FC will try to extend their history-making run when they visit Olympique Lyonnais for the first leg of their last-16 tie.

- APOEL have enjoyed an impressive campaign so far, topping Group G. Rémi Garde's Lyon finished runners-up behind Real Madrid CF in Group D only after an astonishing escape act in their last fixture – winning 7-1 at GNK Dinamo Zagreb to overtake AFC Ajax on goal difference.

Match background

- Lyon have experience on their side entering this contest – they are competing in the round of 16 for the ninth season running. That said, after three successive quarter-final appearances between 2004 and 2006, they have fallen at this hurdle in four of the last five campaigns, the only exception being 2009/10 when they reached the semi-finals. Last term, under Claude Puel, they bowed out at this stage against Real Madrid.

- Lyon have lost at home only once at this stage of the UEFA Champions League, 2-0 against AS Roma in the 2006/07 edition. Their Stade de Gerland record in round of 16 matches is W4 D3 L1.

- The Ligue 1 side have had mixed fortunes at home this term. After wins against FC Rubin Kazan and Dinamo Zagreb in the play-offs and group stage respectively, they lost to Real Madrid and were held 0-0 by Ajax – a result that looked to have cost them qualification prior to that victory in Zagreb.

- While Lyon have never faced Cypriot opposition before, this is APOEL's second tie against a French team – they went down 3-0 on aggregate to Paris Saint-Germain FC in the 1993/94 UEFA Cup Winners' Cup first round. Jean-Luc Sassi hit the only goal of the first leg in Nicosia before Paul Le Guen and Xavier Gravelaine inflicted further damage on APOEL in Paris.

- Ivan Jovanović's APOEL recorded three successive away draws in the group stage, avoiding defeat at FC Shakhtar Donetsk, FC Porto and FC Zenit St Petersburg. Including the qualifying rounds and play-offs, their away record this season is W2 D3 L1. In those six games their miserly defence has conceded only three goals, keeping three clean sheets.

Team ties

- Ailton came off the bench to score for FC København in a 3-1 defeat by Olympique de Marseille in the 2009/10 UEFA Europa League round of 32 – a result that confirmed a 6-2 aggregate loss. As a substitute for FCK in the group stage of the 2008/09 competition, he saw Bafétimbi Gomis hit AS Saint-Étienne's opening goal in a 3-1 loss to Les Verts in Copenhagen.

- Briand and Yoann Gourcuff helped France beat Nuno Morais's Portugal in a group match at the 2006 UEFA European Under-21 Championship final tournament.

- Briand was a scorer for France in a 2-0 win against Athos Solomou's Cyprus in a European U21 Championship qualifier in October 2005.

- Constantinos Charalambides and Marios Ilia suffered a 4-0 defeat in France with the Cyprus national team in a 2006 World Cup qualifier in October 2005. Along with Marinos Satsias they also featured in the earlier 2-0 home reverse in October 2004. Satsias is a veteran of an even heavier loss to Les Bleus – 5-0 at the Stade de France in UEFA EURO 2004 qualifying.

- Lisandro helped FC Porto record three Portuguese Liga victories against Kaká's A. Académica de Coimbra between 2006 and 2008.

- Lyon suffered their third loss in 33 home matches, following defeats by Stade Rennais FC (2-1 on 18 November) and Real Madrid CF (2-0 on 2 November).
- Caen, who had not won at Lyon in 11 previous attempts, claimed their first victory in over three months.
- Romain Hamouma's early goal meant Lyon fell behind for the fourth successive game.
- Forwards Gomis (5), Lisandro (6), Jimmy Briand (3) and Alexandre Lacazette (4) have scored 18 of Lyon's 20 goals this year. Källström has also registered, while Olympique de Marseille's Souleymane Diawara put through his own net as OL battled from two down to draw 2-2 on 5 February.
- Rémi Garde's team have kept only eight clean sheets in 37 games in all competitions this season.
- Lyon have won 11 of their last 15 games, dating back to their 0-0 draw with AFC Ajax on 22 November.
- Les Gones remain in the hunt for a quadruple after a 4-2 extra-time victory at FC Lorient on 31 January took them through to the League Cup final against Marseille in Paris on 14 April.
- They are also in the Coupe de France quarter-finals after a 3-1 extra-time win against FC Girondins de Bordeaux on 8 February.
- With Bakary Koné and John Mensah on Africa Cup of Nations duty, Cameroon-born central defender Samuel Umtiti made his debut on 11 January. The 18-year-old has started seven of Lyon's last eight games.
- Gomis has struck nine goals in his last 11 outings, and had scored in each of Lyon's previous five games before Saturday.

Injury news

- Rémy Vercoutre was an unused substitute on Saturday after recovering from ruptured tendons in right foot suffered on 27 October.
- Dejan Lovren is yet to feature in 2012 due to an Achilles problem.
- Mensah, out with a calf injury since 11 October, returned to action at the Africa Cup of Nations on 24 January.
- Anthony Lopes (broken right fibula and torn ankle ligament, out since 29 September), is back in action for Lyon reserves.
- Yannis Tafer, out of action since breaking a foot at last summer's FIFA U-20 World Cup, made his comeback for Lyon reserves at the end of January.

- Mensah has been on Africa Cup of Nations duty, scoring two goals in four games (although he was also sent off) as Ghana finished fourth; they lost Saturday's third-place play-off against Mali.
- Lovren signed a two-year contract extension on 23 January, committing to Lyon until summer 2016.
- The planning application for Lyon's new stadium, the 58,000-seater Stade des Lumières, was approved on 3 February. Work will begin in the coming weeks with the club aiming to move in for the start of 2014/15.

- APOEL have suffered an indifferent start to 2012, managing just four wins in eight outings.
- Midfielder Nuno Morais was utilised as a makeshift centre-back because of injuries to Oliveira and Paulo Jorge. Another defender, William Boaventura, was suspended.
- Since a 9-1 Cypriot Cup victory against second division Akritas Chlorakas FC on 11 January, the Nicosia outfit have scored just five times in six outings – their most barren spell in front of goal this season.
- APOEL trail AEL Limassol FC 1-0 after the home leg of their Cypriot Cup third round tie on 25 January; the second leg takes place on 23 February.
- Esteban Solari has scored 52 goals in 91 league games over two spells at APOEL, who have never lost when he has registered.
- Of the 58 goals APOEL have scored in all competitions this season, 44 have come after half-time.
- Urko Pardo, who made his debut as a replacement on matchday three, has conceded eight goals in 16 appearances.

Injury news

- Gustavo Manduca returned on Friday after four games out with a hamstring injury.
- Paulo Jorge (gluteus) and Oliviera (calf) missed Friday's game with injuries suffered in APOEL's 0-0 league draw with AEL on 5 February; Adorno has missed the club's last two matches due to a calf sprain.
- Aílton returned to action on 5 February after two-and-a-half months out with a hernia problem. William Boaventura, sidelined with an ankle injury since 23 October, returned on 11 January.

- Christos Kontis retired after suffering a heart attack at AEK Larnaca FC on 29 August. The 36-year-old played every minute of UEFA Champions League qualifying and scored the only goal against AC Omonia in the Cypriot Super Cup on 7 August.

Head coach

Olympique Lyonnais: Rémi Garde

Date of birth: 3 April 1966

Nationality: French

Playing career: Olympique Lyonnais, RC Strasbourg, Arsenal FC

Coaching career: Olympique Lyonnais

- Born in L'Arbresle in the Rhone – the same town as OL owner Jean-Michel Aulas – Garde joined local side Lyon aged 18. A slight but astute defensive midfielder, he worked his way up to the first team, with whom he won promotion to Ligue 1 in 1988/89.
- A first international cap followed in 1990 in France's friendly win against Kuwait, and Garde was subsequently included in Michel Platini's squad for the 1992 UEFA European Championship in Sweden, although he did not feature in any of Les Bleus' three games.
- Left Lyon in 1993 to join Strasbourg, where he spent three seasons, reaching the final of the Coupe de France – which the Alsace team lost to Paris Saint-Germain FC – in the second of those campaigns.
- Then opted to try his luck abroad as Arsène Wenger took him to Arsenal, where he spent three years and with whom he won the Premier League and the FA Cup in 1998 before a persistent knee injury forced him to hang up his boots a year later.
- Joined Lyon's technical staff in 2003, initially as a TV analyst, but filled a variety of roles before taking over as head of the club's academy in 2010/11. The following summer he succeeded Claude Puel as head coach, signing a one-year contract with the option for a further 12 months.

APOEL FC: Ivan Jovanović

Playing career: FK Dojnica, FK Rad, Iraklis FC

Coaching career: Niki Volou FC, Iraklis FC (twice), APOEL FC (twice), Panachaiki GE

- Born in Dojnica in what was then Yugoslavia, Ivan Jovanović joined his hometown club in 1972 and stayed there for the next 12 years before moving on to Rad. Five seasons and 15 goals in 121 league appearances later, the midfielder opted to try his luck in Greece with Iraklis, for whom he featured in 271 league games – scoring an impressive 52 goals – before hanging up his boots in 1999.
- A move into coaching followed in 2001/02, Jovanović taking charge of Niki Volou and steering them to promotion to the Greek third division before returning to Iraklis as coach.
- Jovanović took over at APOEL in 2003, leading the Cypriot club to the league title in his first season before being lured back to Greece, first by Panachaiki and then by Iraklis again.
- Returned to APOEL in January 2008, that season ending with victory in the Cypriot Cup. The league title followed again a year later, before APOEL came through three qualifying rounds to become only the second Cypriot club to reach the UEFA Champions League group stage, where they drew with Club Atlético de Madrid twice and at Chelsea FC.
- Another league title was won in 2011, APOEL again emerging through three UEFA Champions League qualifying rounds to book a group stage return.

- A match official from Terni, Paolo Tagliavento has been working in Serie A in his native Italy since 2003/04, getting his first taste of UEFA competition the following year.

- A hairdresser by profession, Tagliavento earned his FIFA badge in 2007 but had been working as a fourth official in the UEFA Champions League and UEFA Cup since November 2004, a role he held on a regular basis in both competitions over the next few seasons.

- Oversaw three games at the 2007 UEFA Regions' Cup, including the final, and began to referee UEFA Cup matches the following season, including RSC Anderlecht-FC Girondins de Bordeaux in the round of 32. Fourth official at two UEFA EURO 2008 qualifiers, Tagliavento refereed two 2010 FIFA World Cup qualifiers.

- Worked at eight matches in the 2009/10 UEFA Europa League and was an additional assistant referee as Club Atlético de Madrid beat Fulham FC in the final in Hamburg.

- Took charge of his first UEFA Champions League group-stage game in December 2010, between Arsenal FC and FK Partizan, and finished the campaign with three games at the UEFA European Under-21 Championship in Denmark, including Spain's final defeat of Switzerland.

Competition facts

UEFA Champions League knockout stage: Did you know?

- Teams have recovered from a first-leg deficit to go through on 24 occasions although only twice – AFC Ajax's defeat of Panathinaikos FC in the 1995/96 semi-finals and FC Internazionale Milano's win against FC Bayern München in the 2010/11 round of 16 – has a side progressed after a home first-leg loss. The biggest losing margin a side has overturned was achieved by RC Deportivo La Coruña in the 2003/04 quarter-finals when they lost 4-1 at AC Milan but won 4-0 at home.
- Twenty ties have been decided on the away goals rule, including six where the triumphant team lost the first leg.
- FC Bayern München hold the record for the biggest first-leg lead with a 5-0 success at Sporting Clube de Portugal in the 2008/09 first knockout round, eventually going through 12-1 after a 7-1 home victory in the second leg. Those two games also featured more goals (13) over its two legs than any previous UEFA Champions League knockout tie.
- Ten ties have gone to penalties, including the game between Arsenal FC and AS Roma in the 2008/09 round of 16. Five of these were finals – 1996, 2001, 2003, 2005 and 2008. The first two-legged tie decided on spot-kicks was PSV Eindhoven's 4-2 win against Olympique Lyonnais on 13 April 2005 after a 2-2 aggregate draw.
- In all, 17 ties have required extra time. So far seven have been decided by extra time alone: four quarter-finals, two first knockout round encounters and the 2007/08 semi-final between Chelsea FC and Liverpool FC.
- There has never been a knockout tie ending goalless after two legs. Ten have finished 1-0 on aggregate, most recently Tottenham Hotspur FC's narrow victory against AC Milan in the 2010/11 round of 16.
- Clarence Seedorf is the only player to win the European Cup with three clubs (AFC Ajax 1995, Real Madrid CF 1998, AC Milan 2003, 2007). Liverpool's Bob Paisley (1977, 1978, 1981) is the only coach to win three times.
- Ottmar Hitzfeld (Borussia Dortmund 1997, Bayern 2001), Ernst Happel (Feyenoord 1970, Hamburger SV 1983) and José Mourinho (FC Porto 2004, FC Internazionale Milano 2010) are the only coaches to win the trophy with two clubs.
- No team has successfully defended the UEFA Champions League trophy with AC Milan (1989, 1990) the last club to win consecutive European Champion Clubs' Cups. Milan (1994, 1995), AFC Ajax (1995, 1996), Juventus (1996, 1997) and Manchester United (2008, 2009) have all returned to the final as holders only to lose.
- Only two teams have ever won the UEFA Champions League on home soil: Borussia Dortmund (1997, final in Munich) and Juventus (1996, final in Rome), while Manchester United FC lost the 2011 final in London. Five teams won Champion Clubs' Cup finals on home soil: Real Madrid CF (1957), FC Internazionale Milano (1965), Manchester United FC (1968), AFC Ajax (1972) and Liverpool FC (1978), while Stade de Reims Champagne (1956), AS Roma (1984) and FC Barcelona (1986) all lost finals in their own country.

UEFA Champions League: Did you know?

- S.S. Lazio goalkeeper Marco Ballotta is the oldest player to compete in the UEFA Champions League having been aged 43 years 252 days when he featured against Real Madrid CF on Matchday 6 of the 2007/08 edition.
- Ryan Giggs is the oldest player to score in the competition, aged 37 years and 148 days, in Manchester United's 2-0 win at FC Schalke 04 on 26 April 2011.
- Celestine Babayaro is the youngest player to have appeared. He was 16 years and 87 days when he started for RSC Anderlecht against FC Steaua Bucureşti on 23 November 1994. He was sent off in the 37th minute.
