Match background

Porto and AC Milan meet for the first time in 18 years with both sides already having ground to make up in Group B although history favours the Italian club, who have never lost in eight previous visits to Portugal.

- Both teams suffered home defeats on Matchday 2, Porto going down 5-1 against section leaders Liverpool and Milan losing 2-1 against Atlético de Madrid. That left the Italian side bottom of the section having been beaten 3-2 at Anfield in their first fixture, when Porto picked up their only point thanks to a 0-0 draw at Atleti.

Previous meetings

- The sides have played in nine previous fixtures, most recently in the 2003 UEFA Super Cup when Milan's Andriy Shevchenko (10) scored the only goal at the Stade Louis II in Monaco.
- That was Milan's fourth win against Porto, three of which have come in the UEFA Champions League group stage. However, the last time they met in this competition, in 1996/97, Porto twice came from behind to win 3-2 at San Siro thanks to Mário Jardel's 82nd-minute goal, his second of the game, before a 1-1 draw in Portugal. Current Porto coach Sérgio Conceição played in both matches.
- Milan enjoyed the upper hand against Porto in the group stage in 1992/93, when they won 1-0 away and at home, and in 1993/94 (3-0 h, 0-0 a), going on to reach the final on each occasion and lifting the trophy in the latter campaign.
- Porto's only other win against Milan came in the sides' first tie, in the 1979/80 European Cup first round when Duda scored the only goal of the two games in the second leg at San Siro.
- Milan have never lost in Porto, where their record is W1 D3 with just one goal conceded.

Form guide

Porto

- This is Porto's 25th UEFA Champions League group campaign, fewer only than Real Madrid and Barcelona (both 26).
- The Portuguese side have qualified for the last 16 on each of their last four appearances in the group stage.
- In 2020/21, Porto finished second in Group C behind Manchester City and ahead of Olympiacos and Marseille. They lost their first game, 3-1 in Manchester, but then remained unbeaten and kept clean sheets in each of the next five (W4 D1).
- In the round of 16, Porto were 2-1 winners at home to Juventus in the first leg, going through on away goals after a 3-2 extra-time defeat in Turin with Sérgio Oliveira's 115th-minute free-kick – his second goal of the game – proving decisive.
- Both legs of the quarter-final against Chelsea were played in Seville, the English club winning the first leg 2-0 and going through despite a 1-0 second-leg defeat.
- Porto finished second in the 2020/21 Portuguese Liga, five points behind champions Sporting CP.
- Porto have lost seven of their last 16 matches in the UEFA Champions League proper (W7 D2) but had won seven of eight home games in the competition's group stage, drawing the other, before losing to Liverpool.
- A 2-0 defeat by Juventus in the 2016/17 UEFA Champions League round of 16 first leg is Porto's sole reverse in their last ten home matches against Italian visitors (W5 D4) with wins in the last two.

Milan

- European Cup winners on seven occasions, Milan are making their first appearance in the group stage since 2013/14. This is the 18th time they have featured, four behind Juventus's Italian record of 22.
- Milan's last 11 UEFA Champions League campaigns have all extended into the knockout rounds, although five of the last six have ended in the round of 16.
- The Rossoneri were beaten by Atlético in the 2013/14 last 16 (0-1 h, 1-4 a) having finished second in their section behind Barcelona, picking up nine points from their six matches.
- Milan have featured in European competition only three times since that 2014 defeat by Atlético, all in the UEFA Europa League. They reached the round of 16 in 2017/18, losing to Arsenal (0-2 h, 1-3 a), before failing to progress beyond the group stage the following season.
- In 2020/21, Stefano Pioli's team finished first in Group H ahead of LOSC Lille, Sparta Praha and Celtic, picking up 13 points, before knocking out Crvena zvezda on away goals in the round of 32 (2-2 a, 1-1 h). Once more they came unstuck against English opposition in the last 16, however, going out 2-1 on aggregate to Manchester United (1-1 a, 0-1 h).

- The Rossoneri have lost their last four UEFA Champions League matches, and have one win in their last nine games in the competition (D3 L5). A 3-0 success at Celtic on Matchday 5 in 2013/14 is their only victory in their last six away games, group stage to final (D1 L4).
- Milan are the only Italian side to win the UEFA Champions League more than once having triumphed in 1994, 2003 and 2007. They were also beaten finalists in 1993, 1995 and 2005 but have not reached the quarter-finals since 2011/12.
- The Rossoneri last visited Portugal in last season's one-off UEFA Europa League play-off, winning an epic shoot-out against Rio Ave 9-8 after a 2-2 draw in which they equalised with a penalty in added time of extra time. Alexis Saelemaekers scored their first goal with Ismaël Bennacer, Simon Kjær, Theo Hernández, Brahim Díaz, Davide Calabria, Sandro Tonali, Rafael Leão and Kjær again, with the decisive kick, all on target in the shoot-out; Bennacer missed his second penalty.
- That was Milan's sixth successive draw in Portugal, where they have never lost (W1 D7).
- Two of Milan's seven European Cup successes came with final wins against Porto's domestic rivals Benfica, in London in 1963 (2-1) and Vienna in 1990 (1-0).

Links and trivia

- Porto coach Conceição played in Serie A with Lazio (1998–2000 and 2003/04), Parma (2000/01) and Inter (2001–03). He won the 1998/99 UEFA Cup Winners' Cup with Lazio, and both Serie A and the Coppa Italia the following season, also lifting the domestic cup with the Rome club in 2003/04. His record against Milan was W3 D6 L2.
- Conceição started both legs of Inter's away-goals defeat by Milan in the 2002/03 UEFA Champions League semi-finals (0-0 a, 1-1 h).
- Conceição's assistant Rui Barros played in Italy for Juventus between 1988 and 1990.
- Have played in Portugal:

- Brahim Díaz scored Spain's goal past Portugal's Diogo Costa in the 2016 UEFA European Under-17 Championship final; the match finished 1-1, Portugal winning 5-4 on penalties despite Díaz converting Spain's fourth kick.
- Pepe and Olivier Giroud both started the UEFA EURO 2016 final, Portugal beating France 1-0 in Saint-Denis.
- Mexico's Jesús Corona and Ismaël Bennacer of Algeria both scored in a 2-2 friendly draw on 13 October 2020.

Latest news

Porto

- Jesús Corona made his 50th appearance in UEFA club competition on Matchday 2.
- Porto were 5-0 winners at third division Sintrense in the Portuguese Cup third round on Friday, Sérgio Oliveira and Evanilson both scoring twice. It was the second time the Dragons had scored five goals in their last five matches.
- Porto are still unbeaten in this season's Portuguese Liga (W6 D2), scoring 18 goals and conceding only five in their eight matches.
- The 2-1 home win against Paços de Ferreira on 2 October extended Porto's unbeaten run in the Portuguese league to 36 games (W27 D9).
- Summer signing Wendell scored the winner in that game, his first Porto goal, after Luis Díaz had struck his sixth league goal of the season.
- Díaz is now the Portuguese Liga's leading scorer this season.
- Pepe returned to action against Paços de Ferreira, his first appearance since suffering a leg injury against Atlético on Matchday 1.

- Diogo Costa won his first senior cap in Portugal's 3-0 friendly win at home to Qatar on 9 October.
- Fábio Vieira and Francisco Conceição both scored in Portugal's 11-0 win against Liechtenstein in a 2023 Under-21 UEFA European Championship qualifier on 7 October, João Mário also providing an assist.
- A Mehdi Taremi goal gave Iran a 1-0 victory over United Arab Emirates in 2022 FIFA World Cup qualifying on 7 October.
- Chancel Mbemba suffered an injury during DR Congo's 1-0 away defeat against Madagascar on 10 October and is expected to be sidelined for a fortnight.
- Otávio returned on Friday having not played since picking up an injury against Liverpool on Matchday 2.
- Goalkeeper Agustín Marchesín had surgery on his right knee on 19 August, returning to play 90 minutes on Friday.
- Diogo Costa was named the Portuguese league's best goalkeeper for September.
- Sérgio Oliveira was named Porto's player of the year and Francisco Conceição newcomer of the year by the club's Dragões de Ouro (Golden Dragons) initiative.
- Pepe became the oldest player to play an official match for Porto in the first round of this season's Portuguese Liga. The Dragons' captain was aged 38 years 163 days when they beat Belenenses on 8 August, eclipsing the record of former goalkeeper Silvino.
- The win against Paços de Ferreira was Sérgio Conceição's 36th successive Portuguese Liga match without defeat, the third longest run for a Porto coach behind Bobby Robson (53 matches) and Vítor Pereira (43).

Milan

- Milan rebounded from the home defeat against Atlético with a 3-2 Serie A win at fellow UEFA Champions League contenders Atalanta on 3 October.
- That was also the scoreline on Saturday, when the Rossoneri came from two goals down at half-time to beat Verona at San Siro.
- Milan have earned 22 points out of the 24 available in the first eight Serie A games, their best total since three points for a win was introduced in 1994/95.
- Olivier Giroud scored Milan's first goal on Saturday, making it three in his last four league appearances, with Franck Kessié opening his club account for the season to equalise at 2-2 before an own goal sealed the points.
- Davide Calabria opened the scoring at Atalanta after 28 seconds, Milan's fastest goal since Rafael Leão struck six seconds into a 2-1 win at Sassuolo on 20 December 2020.
- Sandro Tonali also scored at Atalanta and has two goals in eight Serie A appearances this season – he managed one in 60 top-flight matches before 2021/22.
- Simon Kjær scored a penalty in Denmark's 4-0 win in Moldova on 9 October and played 90 minutes of the 1-0 home success against Austria three days later that booked the Danes' place at the 2022 FIFA World Cup.
- Kessié also scored a penalty, for the Ivory Coast in a 2-1 win over Malawi on 11 October.
- Theo Hernández scored the late winner to complete France's 3-2 comeback victory against Belgium in the UEFA Nations League semi-final on 7 October – his first international goal on only his second appearance – and then set up Kylian Mbappé's winning strike in the 2-1 final win against Spain three days later. He has not played since due to illness.
- Rafael Leão made his international debut for Portugal in a 3-0 friendly win against Qatar on 9 October.
- A substitute in Italy's 2-1 UEFA Nations League semi-final defeat against Spain at San Siro on 6 October, Calabria withdrew from the squad with a thigh injury ahead of the third-place play-off win against Belgium but played 90 minutes for Milan on Saturday.
- Zlatan Ibrahimović, who turned 40 on 3 October, came on for the final 13 minutes on Saturday having been sidelined by an Achilles injury. He had previously played only 30 minutes this season, as a substitute in a 2-0 home win against Lazio on 12 September in which he scored Milan's second goal.
- Tiémoué Bakayoko has not played since suffering an Achilles injury against Lazio.
- Alessandro Florenzi is expected to be out for around a month after undergoing arthroscopic knee surgery on 1 October.
- Goalkeeper Mike Maignan has undergone keyhole surgery to resolve a recurring left wrist problem.
- Daniel Maldini, who celebrated his 20th birthday on 11 October, returned with a knee injury from international duty with Italy's Under-20 side but started for Milan on Saturday, although he was withdrawn at half-time.

- Ante Rebić was taken off after 36 minutes against Verona at the weekend due to a muscular problem.
- Denmark captain Kjær and the Danish medical team, whose quick reactions and expertise saved the life of Christian Eriksen at UEFA EURO 2020, were presented with the 2021 UEFA President's award in Istanbul on 26 August.
- Kjær is on the 30-man shortlist for the Ballon d'Or, with the winner to be announced on 29 November.

Competition facts

UEFA Champions League: Did you know?

Overall records

- Chelsea in 2012/13 are the only defending champions to fail to get through a group stage since the UEFA Champions League began. (This record, like the others, includes the seasons between 1999/2000 and 2002/03 that featured a second group stage). In 1992/93, Barcelona were the reigning European Champion Clubs' Cup holders and lost 4-3 on aggregate in the second round to CSKA Moskva.
- In 2016/17 Real Madrid became the first team to successfully defend the UEFA Champions League trophy, with AC Milan (1989, 1990) the previous club to win consecutive European Cups. Milan (1994, 1995), Ajax (1995, 1996), Juventus (1996, 1997) and Manchester United (2008, 2009) all returned to the UEFA Champions League final as holders only to lose.
- Real Madrid then made it three wins in a row in 2017/18, becoming the fourth club to win three or more successive titles in European Cup history, and the first to do it twice.
- Only two teams have ever won the UEFA Champions League on home soil: Borussia Dortmund (1997, final in Munich) and Juventus (1996, final in Rome), while Manchester United lost the 2011 final in London and 12 months later Bayern München were beaten in the showpiece in their own stadium, the Fußball Arena München.
- Bayern's victory against Paris Saint-Germain in the 2020 UEFA Champions League final was their 11th successive win in the competition (18 September 2019 to 23 August 2020), setting a new record that they extended to 15 before being held at Atlético de Madrid on Matchday 5 in 2020/21. Bayern themselves (2 April 2013 to 27 November 2013) and Real Madrid (23 April 2014 to 18 February 2015) jointly held the previous best with ten, one more than Barcelona's winning run between 18 September 2002 and 18 February 2003.

- Barcelona have finished as group winners on 21 occasions, four more than Real Madrid and Bayern München and six more than Manchester United. Barça also hold the record for the most unbeaten group stage campaigns with 13, five more than Real Madrid.
- Seven teams have recorded six successive victories in a UEFA Champions League group stage: Milan (1992/93), Paris Saint-Germain (1994/95), Spartak Moskva (1995/96), Barcelona (2002/03, first group stage), Real Madrid (2011/12 and 2014/15) and Bayern (2019/20).
- Twenty-one teams have gone through a UEFA Champions League group stage without picking up a single point, most recently AEK Athens in 2018/19.
- In 2017/18, Paris Saint-Germain set a new group stage record by scoring 25 goals, one more than Bayern München managed in 2019/20. Liverpool are next on the list having scored 23 in 2017/18 with Borussia Dortmund hitting 21 in 2016/17. Manchester United (1998/99), Barcelona (2011/12, 2016/17) and Real Madrid (2013/14) all managed 20.
- Only Deportivo La Coruña (2004/05), Maccabi Haifa (2009/10) and Dinamo Zagreb (2016/17) have failed to score in a group stage.
- BATE Borisov conceded 24 goals in 2014/15, a new group stage record which was matched by Legia Warszawa in 2016/17. The previous mark, 22, was held by Dinamo Zagreb (2011/12) and Nordsjælland (2012/13).
- No team has ever gone through a UEFA Champions League group stage without conceding a goal. Milan (1992/93), Ajax (1995/96), Juventus (1996/97 and 2004/05), Chelsea (2005/06), Liverpool (2005/06), Villarreal (2005/06), Manchester United (2010/11), Monaco (2014/15), Paris Saint-Germain (2015/16), Barcelona (2017/18) and Manchester City (2020/21) all let in just one.
- Matchday 6 of 2013/14 marked FCSB's 23rd successive game in the competition without a victory, surpassing the previous record of 22 set by Spartak Moskva between December 2000 and November 2006.
- Marseille hold the record for successive defeats in the competition, group stage to final, having lost 13 in a row between March 2012 and November 2020. The 2-0 loss at home to Porto on Matchday 4 of the 2020/21 competition surpassed Anderlecht's previous competition record of 12 losses in a row between December 2003 and November 2005. Dinamo Zagreb are next with 11 consecutive losses on two occasions, from September 2011 to November 2012 and September 2015 to December 2016.
- The lowest total for a team qualifying from the group stage is six points: Zenit in 2013/14 and Roma in 2015/16. Since three points for a win was introduced in 1995/96, ten teams have made it through with seven points: Legia Warszawa (1995/96), Dynamo Kyiv (1999/2000), Liverpool (2001/02, second group stage), Lokomotiv Moskva (2002/03, first group stage) and eventual finalists Juventus (2002/03, second group stage), Rangers and Werder

Bremen (2005/06), Galatasaray (2013/14), Basel (2014/15) and Atalanta (2019/20).

- Napoli failed to qualify from their group with 12 points in 2013/14, the highest total of any team not to reach the next stage when the top two in each section progressed. Dynamo Kyiv (1999/2000, second group stage), Borussia Dortmund (2002/03, second group stage), PSV Eindhoven (2003/04), Olympiacos and Dynamo Kyiv (both 2004/05), Werder Bremen (2006/07), Manchester City (2011/12), Chelsea and Cluj (both 2012/13), Benfica (2013/14), Porto (2015/16) and Ajax (2019/20) all missed out with ten points.

Goalscoring records

- Lionel Messi became the first player to score five goals in a match in Barcelona's 7-1 win against Bayer Leverkusen on 7 March 2012, a feat matched by Shakhtar Donetsk's Luiz Adriano at BATE Borisov on 21 October 2014. Fifteen more players, also including Messi and Robert Lewandowski twice, have scored four times in a game, most recently Sébastien Haller for Ajax at Sporting CP on Matchday 1 in 2021/22. That was the fifth quadruple in succession to be scored away from home after Bayern's Serge Gnabry and Lewandowski (group stage v Tottenham and Crvena zvezda respectively) and Josip Iličić (Atalanta v Valencia, round of 16 second leg) all achieved the feat in 2019/20 and Olivier Giroud did likewise for Chelsea at Sevilla in the 2020/21 group stage.

- Cristiano Ronaldo set a new record for a UEFA Champions League group stage with 11 goals in 2015/16, Messi got ten goals in 2016/17, a figure matched by Robert Lewandowski in 2019/20; Ronaldo (2013/14, 2017/18) and Luiz Adriano (2014/15) scored nine while Zlatan Ibrahimović (2013/14), Ruud van Nistelrooy (2004/05), Filippo Inzaghi, Hernán Crespo (both 2002/03), Lewandowski (2018/19) and Erling Braut Haaland (2019/20) all managed eight.

- Messi's hat-trick against PSV Eindhoven on Matchday 1 of the 2018/19 competition was his eighth in the competition, a mark Ronaldo matched against Atlético de Madrid in that season's round of 16 second leg.

Oldest and youngest players

- Lazio goalkeeper Marco Ballotta is the oldest player to compete in the UEFA Champions League having featured against Real Madrid on Matchday 6 in 2007/08 aged 43 years 252 days. Alessandro Costacurta is the oldest outfield player; the Milan defender was 40 years and 211 days when he played against AEK Athens in 2006/07.

- Francesco Totti is the oldest player to score in the competition, aged 38 years 59 days, in Roma's 1-1 draw at CSKA Moskva on 25 November 2014. Ryan Giggs (37 years 290 days) was the previous record holder.

- Youssoufa Moukoko is the youngest player to have appeared, aged 16 years 18 days for Borussia Dortmund at Zenit on 8 December 2020. He replaced Celestine Babayaro, who was 16 years 87 days when he started for Anderlecht against Steaua Bucureşti on 23 November 1994; Babayaro was sent off in the 37th minute.

- Ansu Fati's winner for Barcelona at Inter on Matchday 6 in 2019/20 made him the youngest goalscorer in UEFA Champions League history, at the age of 17 years 40 days. He eclipsed the previous record of Olympiacos's Peter Ofori-Quaye (17 years 195 days) that had lasted since 1 October 1997.
